

Construction Industry COVID-19 Poll

Industry Position

In the context of the current pandemic, the construction industry is well placed in the eyes of US adults to help get the economy back on track with 84% saying that construction will play at least a medium or a large role.

Views of the building and construction industry are generally favorable – with 81% holding a positive view. However, Engineering (86%) and Architecture (84%) rank slightly higher in overall favorability, competing for the top spots with Technology (86%) and Hospitals (84%). The general public doesn't have particularly negative feelings about the building and construction industry that are out of line with others, with 19% saying they have an unfavorable opinion of the industry. By contrast, 42% hold a negative view of the oil and gas industry.

Compared to other policy issues, only 39% of US adults think increasing spending on roads, bridges and other infrastructure should be a top priority. It should be noted that even if many do not see infrastructure investment as a top priority, 84% do consider it at least important. This trend carries when asked about the importance of investing in infrastructure directly with 95% believing that it is important that the US continue investing in infrastructure, with the bulk believing that it is very important (59%).

Pandemic Effects

The global COVID-19 pandemic has touched all aspects of American life and the construction industry is no exception. When compared to the overall economy, small businesses and large businesses, US adults place their concern about the impact of the pandemic in areas outside of the construction industry. Concern about the impact of COVID-19 is highest for small businesses (89%) and the overall economy (88%), followed by large businesses (70%) and then the construction industry (67%).

There is strong support for overall construction to continue during the pandemic – 84% say it is important for construction to continue. More specifically, the public believes it is most important to continue construction at this time on hospitals (92%), followed by power (90%), road travel (87%), and environmental projects (86%). While still maintaining high levels of overall support, businesses (74%) schools/universities (75%) and houses/apartments (80%) fall in the bottom tier of construction projects to continue during the pandemic.

Education Priorities

A huge boon that the construction industry provides to society is good-paying jobs where a four-year degree is not required. When compared to other issues, there is broad support among the US public for the development of career opportunities that do not need a 4-year degree (81% top priority/important priority).

Further, a majority of the US public agrees (65%) that a 4-year degree is not needed to get a good job, with only 35% disagreeing. When asked about the existence of high-paying jobs that require shorter and less expensive training than a 4-year college degree, 78% of people believe that those jobs exist.

One especially bright spot is that a solid majority of the American public (90%) believes in the effectiveness of apprenticeships and credentialing programs as a pathway to good-paying jobs and career paths.
