

America Inward

As part of a series of polls to understand the effects of COVID-19 on people, businesses and institutions, APCO Worldwide surveyed Americans on April 17, 2020. In this latest polling, APCO, a global advisory and advocacy communications firm, explored how COVID-19 is affecting American's outlook on the pandemic's global impact on trade, politics and the economy.

Americans are pessimistic about the country's global standing over the next three years.

58% believe COVID-19 will weaken the strength of the U.S. economy over the next three years

and half (48%) see the United States' image as a global leader weakening.

58% of Americans believe the COVID-19 crisis will make countries more self-reliant and independent.

Most Americans believe global commerce and trade will be harmed by the pandemic.

Three-in-five (59%) believe there will be a decrease in global trade over the next three years.

59% also believe the crisis will harm businesses that operate in multiple countries.

65% believe it's likely the pandemic will cause a reduction in international travel over the next three years.

46% of people are not confident in companies that manufacture essential products in China

like medical supplies, drugs and technology.

Just 4% of people believe multinational businesses will play a role in helping the United States return to what it was like before the crisis,

compared to 40% looking to state and local governments.

Mistrust will be a defining characteristic of U.S. relationships with other countries, including key allies.

A two-thirds majority (66%) believe COVID-19 will cause mistrust in U.S. relationships with China and Russia over the next three years.

44% say the pandemic will cause long term mistrust with U.S. allies, like the UK and Japan.

Yet, two-thirds (67%) believe the crisis will change our collaboration with other countries,

and more see this as positive (42%) than negative (24%).

Negative views of China are intensifying.

A plurality of Americans (42%) blame the Chinese government for harm caused to the American people by the COVID-19 pandemic;

followed by President Trump, who is blamed by one-third of Americans (32%). 20% of people believe "no one specifically" is to blame for the pandemic.

China is overwhelmingly seen as a competitor to the United States (71% agree) that puts its own interests and people first (68%).

Nearly half of Americans view China is "an enemy of the United States" (48%),

with only 18% disagreeing with this statement.

However, 46% view China as a necessary partner to the United States.
